About the Position

Frog Hollow Neighbourhood House's 'Make It!' is a therapeutic art program run from Drive Youth Employment Services and other Frog Hollow locations, for youth aged 15-30 who are impacted by mental health challenges. The program consists of a weekly drop-in 'open studio', where youth can create art in a supportive environment, with some activity guidelines if needed. Sessions are mainly inperson and occasionally online.

The Art Therapist works alongside the Program Coordinator to design and facilitate 'Make It' sessions, as well as supporting program planning and occasionally assisting with community art projects such as murals and shows. If hours permit, the Art Therapist may provide some 1:1 counselling support to 'Make It' participants. The Art Therapist reports to the Make It Coordinator, and works remotely and inperson.

Hours: 7 hours/week, schedule determined with Make It Coordinator

Contract Period: November 2024-March 31 2025 with possibility of extension

Salary: \$31.62 per hour

Duties and Responsibilities:

- Develop themes and co-facilitate program sessions with the Make It! Coordinator
- Lead art workshops to encourage artistic growth and mental wellbeing while responding to youth's needs

- Provide 1:1 counselling support to youth in the program when the schedule permits
- Attend occasional community art project sessions, when the schedule permits, to provide therapeutic support and mediation on site
- Collaborate with the Make It! Coordinator to ensure the program is safe, accessible and inviting to youth of all backgrounds
- Assist with developing youth surveys to evaluate the program's impact on mental health
- Provide support to youth overcoming challenges and develop strategies to respond to their needs

Qualifications:

- Registered Art Therapist
- Two or more years of experience providing support to marginalized youth
- Experience in group facilitation and youth mentoring
- Experience in trauma informed counselling
- Excellent verbal and written communication skills with an artistic background preferred
- Confident public speaker; skilled in outreach and public engagement
